
INTRODUCTION

We're excited to share the first official update on Al-Tahrir Village, a newly constructed community in northern Syria, marking a major step forward in our mission to support displaced families in returning to their homeland.

The village includes 340 homes, complete with full water and sanitation infrastructure, as well as access to nearby schools and healthcare facilities.

Built in partnership with local communities, Al-Tahrir offers a practical alternative for families who are unable to return home, ensuring safety and dignity.





REBUILDING SYRIA PROJECT

Al-Tahrir is part of Action for Humanity's Rebuilding Syria Project, a pioneering, holistic approach to post-conflict recovery that brings together housing, infrastructure, health, and livelihoods.

Our vision goes beyond housing needs; it's about restoring a sense of belonging, stability, and hope in a newly liberated country whose children have only ever known war.

During the 14-year civil war, over 14 million people were forced to flee their homes in search of safety, with 7.4 million internally displaced. Since the liberation in 2024, millions of families are finally returning home; however, for many, their communities no longer exist. Their homes are too damaged, unsafe, or cut off from essential services.

Syria needs to rebuild from the ground up. With your support, this moment of return can become a turning point, where emergency aid gives way to long-term recovery and lays the foundations for a more stable and self-sufficient Syria.





PROGRESS REPORT

Thanks to your support, Al-Tahrir Village will be fully operational later this year.

Despite the challenges of working in a post-conflict environment, here's what we've accomplished so far:



340 homes built, each with two rooms, a kitchen, a bathroom, and a veranda - covering 53.7m² of living space.



Clean water and sanitation systems fully installed across the site.



2,040 rightholders safely relocated from the site with access to temporary shelter and sanitation.



Remaining funds redirected to repair damaged homes, schools, and mosques in newly liberated areas.



Access to the local school, health centre, and mosque is available in nearby.



A wastewater treatment plant is scheduled for construction to support long-term sustainability.





WHAT'S NEXT?

As construction nears completion, we're wrapping up the final works, launching the wastewater plant, relocating families, and carrying out repairs to homes and infrastructure using the remaining funds. Once finished, the project will be transferred to local authorities for ongoing support and long-term sustainability.

WHY THIS PROJECT MATTERS

Al-Tahrir Village was developed in direct response to what displaced families told us they needed to return home. In April 2025, we conducted a survey of families across 55 displacement camps to understand the barriers holding them back.

The results were clear:



86% said there was no infrastructure: no roads, schools, or hospitals.

Al-Tahrir is designed to address these issues headon. It provides safe housing, complete water and sanitation systems, and access to nearby services, including schools and healthcare. Families who cannot return to their original homes now have a secure place to rebuild their lives.

This project is part of a broader shift from short-term aid to long-term, community-led recovery. It's about removing the practical barriers to return and creating the conditions families need to live with safety, stability, and dignity.



79% lacked any source of income.



64% reported their homes were too badly damaged.



58% had no means of transportation to return.



42% said their homes were partially destroyed and uninhabitable.



40% raised concerns about poor health conditions and disease.



REMOVING BARRIERS TO RETURN



DAMAGED HOMES

We've built 340 new homes in Al-Tahrir for families who are unable to return to their original homes. The remaining funds are being used to repair homes damaged in newly liberated areas.



LACK OF INFRASTRUCTURE

Al-Tahrir is equipped with clean water and sewage systems, and a wastewater treatment plant is currently underway. Families also have access to schools and healthcare in nearby.



NO LIVELIHOOD OPPORTUNITIES

Without a way to earn a living, return feels impossible. Our campaign includes support for livelihoods through community-led recovery and local economic development.



LACK OF TRANSPORTATION

340 families were safely relocated to a temporary shelter near the site. Transport assistance is also part of the broader campaign to help more families return.



PARTIALLY DESTROYED HOMES

In addition to new homes in Al-Tahrir, we're repairing partially damaged houses elsewhere to make them livable again.



RISKS

Homes in Al-Tahrir include clean water, sanitation, and hygiene facilities. A new treatment plant and access to nearby healthcare reduce health-related risks.
